RARE MACHIN FIND!



So what is new in the stamp world?.

To be honest I really don't know as I was overseas for three weeks during May. One of the emails I got while I was away was about a GB Machin that was for sale on eBay

Really quite remarkable offering. The stamp is shown.

What do you think. It was being offered at a starting price of US \$9.99. I think someone is on more drugs than me, and mine are only malaria tablets – honest.

Has to be something rare about it. One reader on the SoGB Board said they would tear the 400,000 of these they had and sell same. Well why not.

The stamp did not sell. But tell me, who is trying to sell this and who do they think they are kidding.

Or does this just go to prove that anyone can try to sell a stamp on eBay, or should I say try to con buyers.

The seller was not an IPDA member, needless to say.

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SOME SCAMS TO WATCH OUT FOR

Some thoughts on scams from an email I received recently.

- 1.) Re-Gummed Stamps I have been finding some excellent stamps that had been re gummed, especially German Airmails, note the X10 price difference between gummed and un gummed. Re gummed stamps are very difficult to detect for me. The trick is to look for gum where the perforations were separated. Also look for signs of hinging under the new gum. That is what I saw on one of the German airmails. caveat de emptor
- 2.) Catalog Value Confusion.
 Earlier this month I picked up a
 dealers stock of Portugal Europa
 stamps that the seller said had a

catalog value of greater than \$2000, he said it was from the current Michel catalog. The Scott catalog value turned out to be about \$1300 It will be hard to make any money on that purchase and I have tied up capital — an expensive mistake. The Michel catalog may be a "Fantasy Dream Value Catalog ". We have run into these in the US where dealers publish catalogs with a value indicated that has nothing to do with fair market value. These are kind of like the Suggested Retail Price SRP or the sticker price on a new car, if you pay that much for it you left money on the table. caveat de emptor

... "FYI besides Scott I will list stamps from Spain with Edifil, Portugal with Afinsa and France with Yvert-Tellier

numbers. I do this as a service to the collector who may reside in the various countries that I specialize. I may mention the Catalog number and the Catalog value from both the Scott and the Countries native catalog. Then I price somewhere in the middle of the range. Scott does not differentiate between MH and MNH so the process does help me to determine what I think is a fair price. "

Editors Footnote: I think using different catalog references is a good idea and just what one would expect from a quality dealer and IPDA member. After all, I think we all believe that some catalog valuations are like car sticker prices, often unrealistically inflated.

NEW ISSUE FROM ROYAL MAIL






Anyone brave enough to ask me to comment on that statement? I think I will let it go through to the keeper, and same goes for any comment about yet another issue from Royal Mail.

READERS EMAIL

"Are you implying that there is a difference between "fine used and used fine"?

This in response to a comment I made about a seller on eBay using the "used fine" term to describe his listing—in my view a deliberately misleading description as such has never existed.

The writer goes on to say

"I myself try to avoid making any such claim on condition, it is too subjective I think it is easier to let the collector call the condition himself. I always include a scan of the item. Terms like fine, good, average, extra fine especially if they are going to affect the sale price should not be included in a description. If a stamp is truly superb mention it and

price it accordingly.

We can learn from the coin collecting investment scams of the 1970-1990's a difference between Fine and Extra Fine has a large % affect on value. Unscrupulous dealers would sell to collectors or investors at the higher condition, and when the collector or investor went to sell the dealers would re evaluate the condition at the lower value"
