#### INTERNATIONAL COOPERATIVE PROJECT ON GIANT PANDA

Editors Note: When I read this I just had to show you a few pictures from my recent visit to Ocean World here in Hong Kong because I took my daughter to see the panda enclose a few weeks ago. Bit of a small enclosure I have to admit but such wonderful creatures to see for real. Anyway this is the stamp version from Malaysia

Malaysian post issued a set of stamps featuring Giant Panda to commemorate International Cooperative Project On Giant Panda.

The giant panda is a rare and beloved animal that only inhabits the six major mountain ranges in Sichuan, Shaanxi and Gansu provinces of China. With a population of less than 2000, the species is included on the endangered list by the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora and is protected by China's Wildlife Protective Law as the special-class protected animal.

Giant pandas are appreciated and cherished by humans the world over; their familiar black and white faces and rounded ears endearing them to children and adults alike. Because of its prominent scientific research value, endangered status, and delightful viewing value, the giant panda is considered a national treasure of China. Though small in number, giant pandas have visited many countries and served as envoys of friendship from China to the world.

With support from the Chinese government and guidance from national and provincial leaders, the Chengdu Panda Base has launched the "International Long-term Cooperative Project of Giant Panda Breeding." This collaborative research effort focuses on giant panda breeding, ethology, protection, and education jointly with Japan, the United States, Spain,



and France. 15 successfully-bred giant pandas resulted from this work, the largest number of panda cubs produced through international cooperative projects in giant panda breeding to date.

#### MEMBERS ARTICLE

Editors Note: My request for articles paid off - thanks everyone, your input has helped me enormously with this issue. I hope other members find the materials as interesting as I did. Always good to get another perspective I think.

The following from Don O'Neal - IPDA #150 - Thanks Don, great idea.

Every stamp dealer has them... massive amounts of duplicates of common stamps. These are stamps that, for the most part, you will probably never sell as singles in your lifetime. As dealers acquire more and more stock from old collections, accumulations, auction lots, and so on, they are left with sometimes thousands of these 'extras.'

I have many common issues in quantities of 100 to over 1000 of a single issue. Some typical examples may include United States 'Prexies' from the 1940s and Liberty's from the 50s and 60s (for American dealers), George VI, Wilding and Machin definitives from the UK, and the definitive/Christmas/pictorial issues from Australia, Western Europe, Africa, Eastern Europe (especially CTOs), the Middle East, and Asia.

A common way to dispose of these extras is to resell them in bulk lots.

But, there is an alternative that you may want to consider which can usually generate more revenue and profit than just selling them in bulk. Now many dealers and collectors may be taken aback by this, but selling your common duplicates to crafters can be a viable alternative. When you know that most of these stamps will never end up in a collector's album, why not put them to good use

I have been an on-line dealer for seven years now, but I only started selling to crafters about a year ago on Etsy.com.

This international site caters to crafters and lovers of hand-made items throughout the world. If you haven't already been there its worth checking out.

In the last 12 months I have received 66 orders totaling over US\$250 in sales on etsy.com from crafters all over the world. Now this may not be a king's ransom, but this is income generated by sales of material that would still be sitting in stock books, boxes and glassine envelopes otherwise.

Of course, marketing to crafters is a bit different than marketing to collectors. They're usually not interested in things like centering, cancellation, absence of minor faults, etc. They are much more interested in a stamp's color, design, theme, and/or suitability for a particular project. They may want stamps with just birds or just purple stamps, etc. One should market to the craft community with this in mind. If you cannot bear the thought of used postage stamps being cut up and/or pasted onto picture frames or lamp bases or jewelry pieces, then you probably don't want to go this route.

I, personally, think this is a great way to help promote interest in stamps, and maybe get more people interested in our wonderful hobby. I hope you agree.

#### FIRST DAY OF ISSUE: "70TH BIRTHDAY OF PRINCE HANS-ADAM II"



His Serene Highness Prince Hans-Adam II celebrated his 70th birthday on 14 February 2015 – an occasion to which tribute is being paid with a special sheetlet. This is, of course, not the first time that Liechtenstein's head of state is being immortalised on a postage stamp. Even his birth was celebrated with three stamps in 1945 and in the following decades the portrait of today's regent adorned Liechtenstein stamps on a regular basis. Below is a small selection of them with the New issue sheetlet shown bottom left.



#### AFDCS TAPS STARKWEATHER AS FIRST DAYS EDITOR

The American First Day Cover Society has chosen Albert W. Starkweather to be editor of *First Days*, its official journal, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors. He begins with the March-April 2015 issue.

Starkweather is also the editor of the *Stamp Insider*, the free online journal of the Federation of New York Philatelic Societies, Inc., and *The Ceremonial*, journal of the American Ceremony Program Society (AFDCS Chapter 58). "I'm pleased a veteran philatelic editor like Al is joining us," said AFDCS President Lloyd de Vries. "I enjoyed working with him at *Stamps*magazine."

First Days is published six times a year, and is available to AFDCS members both online and printed. Its regular features include "First Cachets Update," "Question Box," and "Cover Exchange," free listings to facilitate trades, as well as feature articles.

Since the Editor is also an *ex officio* member of the AFDCS Board of Directors, Executive Committee, and Publications Committee, Starkweather becomes a member of those bodies.

The American First Day Cover Society is the world's largest not-for-profit organization dedicated to the collecting of FDCs.

#### THE CEYLON PROVISIONALS OF 1885

Editors Note: This lovely piece from Member Alex Green who replied to my request for articles. Thanks Alex, I hope we hear more from you as this is very interesting.

Alex Green is the southernmost member of the IPDA, he sells British Commonwealth stamps and covers on bidStart

The Ceylon Government Gazette of 20<sup>th</sup> February 1885 announced all obsolete stamps were to be de-monetized after 15<sup>th</sup> April 1885. Throughout 1885 some 36 different surcharges were released, not including watermark varieties, shades and errors. Prices range from a couple of dollars to well over \$10,000.

The volume of surcharges raised philatelic eyebrows at the time, and still raises questions today. Why were such a large number of surcharged stamps released over a short period of time?

In 1884 the Rupee was subject to depreciation in value. This further impacted on postal rates, which were rising anyway.

On 1<sup>st</sup> January 1885 the inland postage rate rose from 4 cents to 5 cents.

The postal authorities in Ceylon also evidently had difficulty forecasting future requirements for postage stamps, running low on current issues.

There was also a desire to use excess stocks of obsolete values. Furthermore, there were delays in the arrival of surcharged issues printed by De La Rue in London.

These were the factors combining to produce a dizzying array of surcharges, including some of the rarities of Ceylon philately.

As with most rare surcharges, the more valuable Ceylon Provisionals should not be bought without a certificate of one of the Expert Committees.

Stamps shown are top to bottom: SG 167; SG 186 and SG 190.
