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Stamp Selling Tip of the Month

This is a case of "making it up as you go along". This is Trinidad & Tobago 1944, SGD22, ScJ5. CV in SG is £140, in Scott (2014) \$110.



It's a nice stamp, and obviously scarce. However, the seller, a well-known major player, has it for sale on Hipstamp for the odd amount of US\$551.25.

The seller's description, "undercatalogued used, as it saw very little use", may well be true, but picking a number and listing it at five times catalogue is hardly doing the trade any favours in such difficult times.

As horrible as this obnoxious virus is, maybe we, as a species, can be better when it's gone. Perhaps.


Take care, stay safe, and tell your loved ones that you do, in fact, love them!


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AGM Report 2020



Muhammed Waseem—Pakistan




My name is Muhammad Waseem and I am from the city of Lahore, Pakistan.

The Delcampe Column







Look What I Found in an Old Statesman Album!


On a recent garage sale Saturday morning trip, the wife calls me. 'I found a stamp album. You want it?'



Postal History Costa Rica Stamps: Official Cover Sent To Mauritania In 1919 By Alfonso Molina—estampillascr (reproduced with permission)

There are moments in philatelic life where an amazing and unique item arrives. This happened to me yesterday when I went to the post office to get an envelope containing this awesome official cover sent to Mauritania in 1919.

Postal History Costa Rica Stamps: Official Cover Sent To Mauritania In 1919.....cont'd

What was the route this cover travelled to get to its destination?

This is an official cover, in this case from the Departamento de Paquetes Postales. It departed San Jose on June 9th 1919. Its destination was Kaiffa, located in the South of Mauritania (French civil territory from 1904 to 1920 when it was declared a French colony), located in Northeast part of Africa.



Just to have an idea on how rare this destination is, the latest census performed in Mauritania in 2013, showed that Kaiffa had 45.000 in habitants. So imagine in 1919 -almost 100 years ago- the number of inhabitants was way smaller.

According to this covers cancellations, it was in transit for almost two months. It departed San Jose on June 9th and there were no other can cels until it arrived in Senegal on August 5th! According to my investigation, even after 1904, when France recognised its separation from Senegal, all correspondence sent to Mauritania had to go through Senegal first.



What caught my attention is

that this cover doesn't have a received cancel at Mauritania. What comes to my mind is that when it arrived in Senegal, the post office workers knew the person this letter was sent to, knew in advance he was no longer in Mauritania and forwarded the cover to his new location. This saved the cover some time. The new destination was Fougerolles, Haute Saone, France. A town located near the borders with Germany and Switzerland.

The cover arrived in Paris on August 21st and finally found its destination on August 22nd in Fougerolles, after almost two months and a half in transit.



Another interesting thing about this cover is that the overprint on the first stamp is thicker

than the others. It seems like a hint of a double overprint.





Philately Around the World - G is for Gibraltar

Gibraltar is a British overseas territory, also known as a Crown Colony. It is a narrow peninsula near the Southern extremity of Spain located at the entrance to the Mediterranean Sea overlooking the Strait of Gibraltar.

From Stanley Gibbons we can read that Spanish stamps could be used in Gibraltar from 1850.

From July 1856 until December 1875 all mail to Spain required postage to be prepaid by Spanish stamps and these issues were supplied by the Gibraltar postal authorities acting as a Spanish Postal Agent.

Stamps of Great Britain were issued for use in Gibraltar from September 1857 and used until the end of 1885. These Great Britain Victoria stamps can be identified by the cancels which containing the numeral A26 or the letter G in oval bars.

When the Gibraltar Legislature decided to print and issue its own stamps the Bermuda design was chosen - seven values were printed and

The stamps were printed in sheets of 240 - four panes of sixty each, in ten horizontal rows of six. The stamps were printed from one plate for each value and it was numbered "1" uncoloured on a disc within a coloured circle and printed photogravure by De La Rue.

The paper used for this special printing from Bermuda's plates was machine-made with a Crown above " CA " watermark and with a comb machine 14 perforation.

During the period 1886 through to 1898 there were some interesting changes to the issues used. The five stamps below are used for example.

The Bermuda overprints were in the contemporary currency of pence and shillings, then in late 1886 Gibraltar issued their own stamps, as Gibraltar, also in pence and shillings.



Philately Around the World - G is for Gibraltar cont'd

By 1889 these were being overprinted in Spanish currency and valid until they were repurchased by the Post Office. In 1889 another issue was released in Spanish currency. However, the depreciation in the Spanish currency due to the result of the Spanish-American War caused the Government to revert to English currency in 1898. The colour shades are generally accepted to be different.





One stamp missing from most Gibraltar collections is the 1889 Spanish currency issue with value omitted (No Value) Error. It is the 10c Carmine value recorded as SG 23b and currently listed by Stanley Gibbons at £7000, although I am tempted to suggest it would fetch far more at auction.

Between 1903 and 1950 a variety of definitive and commemorative stamps were issued for the reigns of King Edward VII, George V and George VI including the common 1918 War Tax over-

prints we see from most British Commonwealth countries. No stamps were issued by Gibraltar for King Edward VIII.

The 1903, 1904 and 1906 issues command some rather high prices and can be a very interesting era to collect given the various papers, shades, and watermarks.

In 1921 a new issue was put on sale in the same designs as the preceding issue but in different colours and watermarked Multiple Script CA. The 1d, 3d, 6d. and 2s. were also issued in different colours during this period, and both ordinary and chalky papers were used.






Philately Around the World - G is for Gibraltar cont'd

The first "commemorative" pictorial Gibraltar stamp was the George V 1931 issue showing the Rock of Gibraltar. In 4 values of 1d scarlet, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d red-brown, 2d pale grey and 3d blue. This is always a set to double check because there are two printings, one perf 14 and the other perf $13\frac{1}{2} \times 14$ which has a significantly higher catalogue value.

One point I think worth noting here for sellers (and buyers) is that when listing this issue one really does have to recognized quality in the listing description. There is so much rubbish listed, let's be up front about this. So many with poor colour, with terrible centering, with pulled perfs. I know this applies to all stamps we list but from my research for this piece I was rather shocked at the terrible quality that exists for this issue.

The usual commemoratives, as found for most British Commonwealth countries, were issued by Gibraltar including the 1935 Silver Jubilee issue, the 1937, Coronation issue, the Victory (1946), Royal Silver Wedding (1948) and the Universal Postal Union (1949) issues.





The beautifully designed and engraved 1938 George VI issue is a pleasure to collect, and one that includes many shades, perforation differences and watermark varieties. Again, an issue where study is required before listing for sale because getting the watermark wrong, for example, could be a costly mistake. The 3d Europa Point stamp SG 125b with perf 13 is listed by SG at £4.50 in mint unhinged condition, whereas the perf 14 copy is listed at £130 and if you have the missing A in the CA watermark that is listed at £2000. Not a listing mistake you want to make!



In 1953 the Queen Elizabeth definitive issue, using some of the same scenes found on the George VI issue was released. Another lovely issue and with just a few varieties for the specialist or for dealers to look for before listing for sale.

It would not be too much of an exaggeration to say that since about the mid 1960s the stamps of Gibraltar have basically been commemoratives with the usual definitive issues and as the years passed they were issued more for the thematic collector

and revenue raising, one might say, than for postal needs, much as is now found

across postal authorities worldwide.



Philately Around the World - G is for Gibraltar cont'd

In 1965 there were two issues, the ITU Centenary issue with two stamps and the International Co-operation Year issue, also with 2 stamps. How things have changed; in 2015, there were 49 stamps excluding miniature sheets. This is the world over I suspect.

But I cannot finish without mentioning one issue from 2019, rather stunning. The 50th Anniversary of Concorde issue from April of that year. Surely just for the thematic collector, as I have yet to work out what Gibraltar had to do with Concorde!, even the Gibraltar Post website has no reference to why this issue other than a 50th anniversary.



The post in Gibraltar is currently run by the Royal Gibraltar Post Office which in 2005 was granted the title of "Royal" by Her Majesty the Queen. Gibraltar is now the only Commonwealth or British Overseas Territory outside the United Kingdom that bears this distinction. The Gibraltar Post Office is now known as the Royal Gibraltar Post Office.

Gibraltar stamps can be bought direct from Gibraltar Post or from WOPA+ Stamps and Coins, the ecommerce platform for collectibles. The IPDA has two members from WOPA+, namely Glendon Martinez and Stefano Blanca Sciacaluga both from Gibraltar.

Exhibition News London 2020 Cancelled

Many shows have been cancelled worldwide, but I think this release from the PTS explains the situation perfectly.

The London 2020 International has been postponed from May 2020 to February 2022 due to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic.

With a risk that, without a postponement solution, London 2020 would face bankruptcy, putting cancellation refunds to our 110+ members at risk, the PTS Council has been working closely with the London 2020 Organising Committee over the last few days to provide recommendations and options to help the Organising Committee's decision on whether to cancel or postpone the event. The success of this International not only affects those PTS members who are stand holders but a bankruptcy position would have a ripple effect throughout the trade, the exhibitors (many of whom are our customers), the reputation of stamp shows and the hobby in general. Affecting all of our PTS members is also the reputation and financial security that Stampex provides the society. Unfortunately, many people still think of the London 2020 International as a PTS or Stampex event so our brand reputations are somewhat linked.

As the May show can not go ahead, the preferred option for the London 2020 team was that the International replace the Spring 2021 Stampex but unfortunately the BDC could not accommodate the needs of the International during this period (the need for more days, more space). Another option was for the International to take place outside of a Stampex window (for example, April 2021) but as the Stampex dates for Spring 2021 and Autumn 2021 are already booked, we would be back in the position of three shows within 7 months which would be damaging to Stampex, and indirectly to the PTS. The available BDC dates in 2021 were also limited due to many exhibitions having to reschedule their 2020 shows. So, the next best alternative was February 2022. The PTS Council voted in favour of cancelling Spring 2022 Stampex to release the space for London 2020 should they want it, giving the London 2020 team a possible solution on what to do and how to do it based on many other consultations they were having with other key stakeholders. For your information, lower priority for the London 2020 team right now but still important, based on representing our members' best interests and our experience of running Stampex, we also made a number of other recommendations to the team regarding communications, marketing, risk management, cash flow management etc. Again, the decision as to what to do with this information is for the London 2020 Organising Committee to make.

We want to be very clear that the decision by the PTS Council to release the Stampex Spring 2022 slot is NOT an indication of a move towards a 'one Stampex a year' strategy. It is an exceptional scenario in this most unprecedented time. In 2021, we have committed to running two shows. We remind everyone that the one Stampex this year, in 2020, was a decision made because the International was due to take place in May and we did not feel that the hobby and trade could sustain three shows within a 7 month time period. We will assess how many shows we will run in 2023 nearer the time as our hobby and trade continues to adapt. Not having a Spring 2022 show does present the PTS with а need to adapt some activity which we will start to look later at this year.



Exhibition News London 2020 Cancelled.....cont'd

We understand many of you will have questions about the London 2020 International date change and we ask that you continue to direct these questions to the event organisers via your Booth Liaison, Mike Kentzer (boothliaison@london2020.co)

We have had a number of queries about taking stands at Autumn Stampex 2020 and we expect demand for stands to increase now that the May 2020 has been officially postponed. As a gesture of goodwill in this difficult time, the PTS Council has committed to reopening the price freeze on stands for Autumn 2020. This means that you will get your Autumn 2019 price if you take the same stand. Please contact Megan (megan@thepts.net) if you would like more information. An up to date floor plan will be available soon. The Autumn Stampex show will go ahead as planned but we will of course continue to monitor government advice over the coming months. We are also accelerating a couple of new projects aimed at promoting our PTS members during this time of economic and social disruption.

Finally, the PTS Handbook which is in development, will still be distributed in May despite the London2020 show being postponed. We are delighted that Gibbons Stamp Monthly have agreed to distribute our Handbook to their 8,000 UK subscribers and retail outlets. We will also share the Handbook far and wide online around the world. More on this soon.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the PTS Council for all of their time and expertise over the last few days. There have been over 100 hours of calls, emails, videos, FaceTimes and Skype/Zoom calls.
