
We don't sell the garbage you see so often see and the caveat emptor excuse is not really an excuse with integrity is it?

Captain Who?

For most of my life I had wanted to be a teacher. I don't know why, just something that has always been at the back of my mind. If I were a teacher, I think one little piece of paper, this one specifically could teach more than any heavy warn out text book ever could. The stamp or piece of paper I have mentioned is Scott# 230, New Zealand from the year 1940. What's so special about this stamp? Let's see what this 2.5" x 1.0" of text book has to offer.

The English navigator Captain James Cook sighted New Zealand on 6 October 1769, and landed at Poverty Bay two days later. He drew detailed and accurate maps of the country, and wrote about the Māori people. His first encounter with Māori was not successful – a fight broke out in which some Māori were killed

Philately Around the World - L is for Luxembourg

Continuing this series, I have chosen Luxembourg for this article. A country I know very little about. Errors or serious omissions are mine and if any reader is an expert in this area please accept my humble apology for this less than knowledgeable attempt to present some information about Luxembourg's postal history and stamps.

Luxembourg is an independent Grand Duchy. It is a small, 1000 square mile, landlocked country bordered by Belgium, France, and Germany with a population of just over 600,000 people.

Luxembourg issued its first stamps on 15 September 1852. They showed a portrait of King William III of the

The classical stamps — those considered part of Luxembourg's early postal history, offer many opportunities for a psylladelic study. The early issues, from say until the beginning of WWII when Luxembourg was occupied by German forces, include paper, perforation, and printing varieties, along with many collectible essays and proofs.

Perhaps a few selected stamps and historical scenes/events will be interesting for readers.




Fig 3: SG222a (Sc152) Celebrating the Birth of Princess Elizabeth 1923 10fr

Unlike some European countries Luxembourg issued stamps in its early years showing some of its heritage, rather than only royalty. I have selected two to start with, Fig 2 and Fig 3 as I think they are quite beautiful both as images and artworks of engraving and design.

The first airmail stamps, shown in Fig 4, were issued in 1931. These four stamps, the 75c, 1f, 1¼f, and 1¾f stamps (SG 297-300; Sc C2-C5) were issued on the same day. (SG and Scott list 6 stamps in the issue - 2 issued on other dates). Covers were also cancelled with stamps of the country that provided the airmail service, usually German or Belgium stamps. In this example two German Weimar Republic Air stamps from the 1926 issue were used. The first airmail covers were stamped with a green "Poste Aérienne / Luxembourg / Avril 1931" circular cachet.




