
Welcome to New Members

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Book Review

U. S. ZEPPELIN AND AIRSHIP MAIL FLIGHTS, by Cheryl R. Ganz


This book is all about U. S. Zeppelin and airship mail flights and Cheryl is the perfect person to write it. She has collected, exhibited, researched, lectured and written about airships for many years.

Each chapter covers a different airship, starting with the "Shenandoah", and continuing on through the ZR-2, ZR-3, ZRS-4 "Akron", and ZRS-5 "Macon".

There is background information on each airship with lots of historic photos of the airships and the people connected with them. Then all types of known covers are shown in color, followed by a flight log of all the flights by that airship.

There is also a special event cover list for the "Akron". The final chapters cover Navy airship bases & squadrons, Army airships, and shows covers from those bases, and finally a section on private & commercial airships, which shows all known souvenir covers carried by them, also in color.

There is an extensive list of references and a comprehensive index.



The book is well done and will be essential for the library of collectors of airship and Zeppelin covers.

Stamps from country Letter Z - Zululand

This has been an interesting series of articles. Actually 25 were written if my memory serves me correctly. I missed the letter Q I think. Thanks to Tony Tripi for the idea. It has been a fun and educational journey over the past 2 years and I hope you have enjoyed the series or at least some of the countries that have been written about. I am waiting on another idea now, for a new series for 2022.

Most of the following material is sourced from Wikipedia and I have not delved into the detail. If anyone is really interested in more specifics, and apart from the SG Commonwealth and British Empire catalogue, I highly recommend this paper African Postal Heritage; African Studies Centre Leiden; APH Paper 16 Ton Dietz South Africa: Zululand; Version January 2017 It is 81 pages of extremely interesting material with an excellent range of stamp images and covers which can be found here

So, since we are at the letter Z it seemed fitting to use Zululand, the last country in the catalogue.

A little history. The Zululand Kingdom was defeated by Britain in the Anglo-Zulu War of 1879 and Zululand was annexed as a British territory in 1887 when a Post Office was opened in Eshowe. An official postal system was not started until May 1st 1888 at which time both Zululand and Natal became members of the UPU. At first the territory used QV stamps of Great Britain and Natal overprinted "ZULULAND. Fig 1.

The first issue also had the 5/- Rose from the 1892 QV issue Fig 2 and the ½d from Natal, Fig 3

The next point to be aware of about stamps from Zululand, as with many other early GB overprints and Government Official issues with overprints is that forgeries do exist - not usurpingly one might think given the very high catalogue values associated with many of the stamps. The existence of forgeries is clearly stated in both the SG and Scott catalogues.

The challenge is to know how to identify a forgery. One way is to get an expert opinion through a certification by a qualified expertiser, like an IPDA member <u>Axel Dörrenbach</u> Or we might look at <u>this website</u> Quite useful. A pity there is not a textual write up. Perhaps readers know of better sources?


Fig 4 - SG 20, SG 24, SG 25, SG 27 and SG 28 QV key plate style issues from 1894 (Sc 15, 19, 20, 22 and 23)

In 1894 the regular QV key plate issues appeared and were in use across 21 Post Offices until the annexation by Natal. Ten stamps. Rather expensive and perhaps difficult to find in good condition? Fig 4 shows a selection of 5.

One stamp of note, the ± 5 with value tablet doubly printed, Fig 5 - SG 29a.

I expect it would auction in the £10,000 range in very fine mint condition - one to keep an eye out for! Again, these stamps have forgeries and especially the two high value stamps, the £1 and the £5.

The Designer was Rem Saakyan, the very well known designer of Armenia stamps, the Printing house was Cartor of France and the stamps were printed 40mmx 40mm with a print run of 20,000.

Baghdad in British Occupation - the Story of Overprinted Stamps

In March 1917, British forces captured the *Vilayet* [province] of Baghdad and took over the city from the Ottomans. Soon many administrative changes took place in the city, among which was the administration of the civil post office. One particular issue raised during the process was a supply of Ottoman stamps that was found in Baghdad. Before leaving Basra and other towns, the Ottoman forces either removed or burned their stamp supplies; however, they did not manage to do the same in Baghdad. The British forces decided to make use of these spoils of war instead of simply trashing them

From General Officer Commanding, Force "D," Baghdad, 1st April 1917. (Addressed to Forcign, Simla, repeated to Secretary of State for India.)

(Received at India Office, 11 p.m.)

T. 999. Reference postage stamps to be used for civil post office, Baghdad. At Basra and towns hitherto occupied, Turks had removed or burnt all stocks of their own stamps. Here in Baghdad small quantities have been obtained from balances lying at Customs House, local merchants and Cox hopes to obtain more from outside towns. I propose to issue these with over-print "Baghdad under British occupation" as was done at Bushire. Please say whether English or Indian stamps are to be used after above supplies have been exhausted and with what if any over-print.

They proposed issuing the stamps with an overprint 'Baghdad under/in British Occupation'. Bradbury Wilkinson & Co. Ltd of London, the firm that once printed the Ottoman stamps, was asked to provide lists of the stamps and their values before reissuing them.

Seeing that the stamps were of various designs and values, questions were raised about where exactly to place the overprint, and whether to overprint all the stamps or only a selection of them. Refer Fig 2 next page.

A certain stamp that caught the attention was a two hundred piastres stamp which bore the portrait of Sultan Beşinci Mehmet Reşat (Muhammad Rashad V, reigned 1909-1918). Refer Fig 1

There were concerns about overprinting his portrait.

1918

Instructions came from the Foreign Secretary Arthur James Balfour that the stamp was not essential for revenue purposes and, that it 'would appear politically desirable to omit it from the series'. It was therefore excluded from the overprinted reissue. Refer Fig 3 next page.

The rest of the stamps were reissued with the overprint on their frames, thereby preserving the image and the writing that appear in the centre of each stamp. Two examples are shown below

A green and cream stamp portraying a lighthouse, an Ottoman tuğrâ (tughra) in the left top corner, and the value of 10 paras (½ An) in the three other corners. SG 2



Baghdad in British Occupation - the Story of Overprinted Stamps cont'd

News of the overprinted stamps soon reached Buckingham Palace and the newly established Imperial/National War Museum. King George V asked for a set of four of each variety for his personal collection. Refer Fig 4

1223 3rd. April, 1917. My dear Lucas,

With reference to the attached telegram marked in blue, from the G.O.C. Force "D" at Bagdad, I write to say that the King hopes you will secure for him a set of this proposed issue of stamps.

As you know, the King likes a corner set of 4 of each variety.

400 FOREIGN OFFICE 1918 February 1st, 1918. Sir:-In reply to your letter, P.253, of the 28th ultimo, relative to the issue of surcharged Turkish stamps in Mesopotamia, I am directed by Mr. Secretary Balfour to state that he considers that it would be undesirable to include the two hundred piastre stamp, which bears a portrait of the Sultan, in this series, and that, in view of the fact that this stamp is not really essential for revenue purposes, it would appear politically desirable to omit it from the series.



CAPEX (Canada Stamp Show 2022 - Toronto, June 9–12, 2022)



The CAPEX 22 dealer bourse will be located in the Constitution Hall of the Metro Toronto Convention Centre (MTCC) North Building. Over 85 booths will be filled with a strong array of Canadian, US and international dealers. CAPEX 22 is the first international stamp exhibition to be held in Canada in over 25 years and many of the top USA and international dealers and auction houses are eager for the opportunity to return to Canada.


The award-winning Canada 1868-1876 Large Queen collection of the late Fred Fawn will be sold by R. Maresch & Son at the CAPEX 22 auction on the evening of Friday June 10, 2022 at the CAPEX 22 venue. The Large Queen issue of the classic period were the first stamps printed in Canada and have long been popular among collectors, specialists and exhibitors. Canada Post will be participating at CAPEX 22 with a large booth in the pre-function area. Canada Post has been an early supporter of CAPEX 22 with the issue of a CAPEX 22 overprint of the Bluenose 100 souvenir sheet issued June 29, 2021 in commemoration of the launching or the storied Bluenose fishing and racing schooner in Lunenburg Nova Scotia in 1921. Canada Post will also be releasing a new stamp during the exhibition which will be unveiled at a Stamp Launch ceremony.






Introduction to Penny Stars

This is a presentation well worth a reading even if you know something about the Penny Stars. Sent to us by Member Tony Ward who, as many of you will know, owns *Great Britain Stamps and Covers*. Tony is a very knowledgeable UK dealer selling good-to-fine mint and used GB from 1840-to-date and Commonwealth to 1970 at reasonable prices: some rather nice material in my view.

This presentation is full of history, detail - excellent on the alphabets, dies, watermarks, inks and shades - very clear images and available on the IPDA website under the Members Only drop down menu - under Exhibits. I include the opening pages here - do enjoy visiting the web site and seeing the full presentation.



Penny Stars

- Produced between 1854 and 1862
- 14 Basic Stamps
- Printed by Perkins Bacon
- Line Engraved or Intaglio method
 - Entire surface covered in ink
 - Wiped away to leave ink in recessed areas
 - Damped paper placed on plate and forced down by roller to pick up ink in recesses





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M. S. Tatsuta Maru



The Tatsuta Maru, also known as Tatuta Maru, was a Japanese ocean liner owned by Nippon Yusen Kaisha (N.Y.K. Line). The ship was built in 1927-1930 by Mitsubishi Shipbuilding & Engineering Co. at Nagasaki, Japan.

The Tatsuta Maru was built for the trans-Pacific Orient-California fortnightly service. Principal ports-of-call included Hong Kong, Shanghai, Kobe, Yokohama, Honolulu, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

In December, 1941, the liner was part of an elaborate Japanese deception plan to mask the unannounced attack on the US Pacific Fleet in Pearl Harbor. She sailed from Yokohama on 2 December bound for San Francisco with the task of exchanging American evacuees from East Asia for Japanese nationals in the United States. She was scheduled to reach the US on 14 December and despite rumours of war the American press wrongly concluded that meant nothing was likely to happen for some time.

The master of the ship had sealed orders to turn around at midnight on 7 December and return to Japan while maintaining radio silence. Subsequently, the Tatsuta Maru was requisitioned as a troopship for the Imperial Japanese Navy.

On February 8, 1943, Tatsuta Maru was torpedoed and sunk by the enemy submarine (USS Tarpon) 42 miles east of Mikurajima. Some 1,400 Japanese soldiers on board were killed.




